- 1974—New Hampshire US Senate election; Louis Wyman beat John Durkin by 2 votes out of 223,363 cast.

- 2004—Washington gubernatorial election, with more than 2.8 million ballots cast, Christine Gregoire defeated Dina Ross by just 133 votes.
- 2008—Minnesota Senate election: After counts and recounts and court appeals, Norm Coleman finally conceded the race to Al Franken 238 days after the election. Franken won by a mere 312 votes. 2,887,646 voters turned out.
- And how can we forget the "hanging chad" debacle in Florida in 2000 where George W. Bush was finally declared winner over Al Gore by 537 votes out of nearly 6 MILLION?
